Finance Officer- Krista Galvin

Finance Officer Krista Galvin reported that as of January 2015, we received \$21,798.52 in Raw Fish Tax and \$60,942.89 in Sales Tax. She included a bank balance.

Administrator - Andy Varner

Administrator Andy Varner reported Mayor Gardner and Lobbyist Mark Hickey and himself had several meetings regarding the City's airport recertification. DOT pushed the time frame to around August. One possibility they explored was the "Gustavus model," where the State has a separate maintenance contract for the airport, and another for the 139 requirements. Administrator Varner attached an updated project timeline for the dock replacement, DOT and PND will visit for a site visit and assessment, the plan to building another dock alongside the existing one is still in place. Mayor Gardner and himself also spoke with Commissioners and legislatures about community jail funding. The City has hired a new Water/Sewer Operator named Allen Young. ANTHC is considering pushing back the Kelly Avenue Outfall Line replacement due to design and how to do the replacement around the beach with equipment. CRW made a site visit and are close to finishing the Water/Sewer Master Plan, they will use the report for upgrades and capital projects using USDA dollars. There is also a timeline for the GCI fiber optic upgrade included for the packet.

Mayor - Glen Gardner, Jr.

Mayor Gardner stated he would like to talk about Street lights during April meetings workshop. The Juneau meetings went good and he acknowledged Lobbyist Hickey's help. This year's SWAMC meeting went well and it was well attended, the Governor made a captivating speech during the first day's lunch. There were presentations on fisheries, ocean acidifications, education and broadband.

Harbor Master - Richard Kochuten, Sr.

Harbor Master Richard Kochuten, Sr. reported hauling and storing boats has been slow, they have done oil changes in the machines, did repair work on the City dock, making dump runs on a regular basis, they hauled building materials to the Fish and Game duplex, the staff are still building bilge blocks. Building Maintenance Kenneth Spjut continues to install cameras around the harbor. They started to clear storage area for the new city dock installation, surveyors were in town surveying the area and were going to do the soundings.

Mayor Gardner asked Harbor Master Kochuten if float A still had light issues. Harbor Master Kochuten replied it is and Water/Sewer Supervisor Allen Hill was going to check the problem. Councilperson Shirley Brown asked if someone was planning to retire, he replied at the end of April, one of the Night watchman.

Here are a few issues and items of note we've been working on since the last report:

DOCK REPLACEMENT

- PND and DOT were out for a site visit a couple weeks ago and met with various City officials. We are starting weekly project meetings. The 20% design and cost estimate is included in the FYI. Here is their report from the site visit:

The site visit went well. I believe we have consensus that construction of a new dock adjacent to the existing is the preferred alternative. The existing dock, while along in its service life, is still in relatively good shape and does not have any significant deterioration or documented load capacity limitations. I think leaving it is the prudent option.

As for the schedule, we did observe the presence of stellar sea lions and heard anecdotally that marine mammals frequent the area often, especially during peak times of the year. As such, we will conduct observations over the next several months to quantify this risk to the project, and if needed, will pursue an incidental harassment permit, which will likely effect the delivery of the project and could delay construction by one season. We are uncertain at this point, but want to be forthright regarding this potential delay. We are also looking at potentially modifying the location of the dock by translating the new structure closer to the existing dock. We have a couple drawings in development to show the potential relocated alternatives.

LEGISLATURE

- As you might be aware, the Legislature is looking at shifting more costs onto local communities as a way for them to avoid proposing any sort of broad based taxes at the state level. By passing on more costs to local governments through increased PERS and TRS contributions, eliminating revenue sharing, and taking away rural airport funding, lawmakers can shrink their budgets by essentially forcing local municipalities to raise their own taxes and fees to make up for the shortfall. It is a short-sighted way to balance Alaska's budget and AML and all of our communities have been vocal about that. (looks like they are dropping the PERS increase for now, but I expect other approaches...)

ENERGY

I applied for a technical assistance grant with Dept of Energy/Alaska Energy Authority called the *Rural Alaska Competition for Energy Efficiency*. Basically, if awarded they will offer up a group of engineers and energy specialists at our disposal to help us form and carry out a strategy for making Sand Point more energy efficient and self-sufficient. TDX is on board with our application, as it essentially took many elements of their high

- penetration wind vision for the community. The winners of the grant will be announced April 26.
- John Lyons of TDX is out visiting this week to look into the wind/heat project for the school and clinic, and also investigate new streetlights in town. There are several details to work out for the clinic project, including electric boiler maintenance and the new electricity rate for the heating kWh's.

GCI/CLINIC

GCI's team was in Sand Point for a couple weeks to perform the fiber installation between the earth station and clinic. After a few little snags that project is wrapping up.

OFFICE COPIER

- Kudos to the Mayor for standing his ground on our office copier. We got the current lease voided on the machine (half way through), didn't pay the last few months, and have a free year of service and maintenance included.

BUDGET

- We'll have first reading of the budget at the May meeting.

PERSONAL LEAVE

- I'm taking some personal leave to go see family down south April 18-29.

We held our public hearing on the annexation petition last month, and I incorporated those meeting minutes and comments into the document. Now the next step in the process is to adopt a Council resolution to formally authorize submitting the petition to the Local Boundary Commission.

Once it reaches the LBC they will do a technical review and let me know how things look. The clock officially starts on the whole process once I submit the file, and then there are more opportunities for public review, analysis, etc. As a reminder, we are trying to line up approval of the annexation petition this year so that it can be before the Legislature next January, since they give the official seal of approval.

If everything is in order and the Legislature does not disapprove the petition, the proposed boundary change becomes effective 45 days after submission. *In essence, the change could be in place by the middle of February, 2017.*

A RESOLUTION OF THE SAND POINT CITY COUNCIL AUTHORIZING THE CITY ADMINISTRATOR TO SUBMIT A PETITION TO THE ALASKA LOCAL BOUNDARY COMMISSION FOR ANNEXATION OF POPOF ISLAND AND ITS SURROUNDING WATERS, APPROXIMATELY 245 SQUARE MILES, TO THE CITY OF SAND POINT BY THE LEGISLATIVE REVIEW METHOD

WHEREAS, the City of Sand Point is a First Class City and is a political subdivision of the State of Alaska; and

WHEREAS, the City wishes to incorporate certain community assets into municipal boundaries, such as the landfill, Red Cove, fishing grounds, and popular hiking and hunting trails; and

WHEREAS, by extending the municipal boundaries to include the remainder of Popof Island and its surrounding waters, the City is preparing to address anticipated economic development and anticipated/existing health and safety concerns; and

WHEREAS, the City's boundaries were last extended and approved by the Local Boundary Commission through annexation in 1994; and

WHEREAS, the community and the region's economy have undergone many changes in that time to warrant further annexation in order to help the citizens, businesses, and Tribes of Sand Point; and

WHEREAS, the legal boundary description of the territory proposed for annexation is attached as "Attachment A," and the territory is shown on the attached map as "Attachment B," both of which are incorporated herein by reference; and

WHEREAS, the City Administrator is designated as the representative of the City for all matters relating to the annexation petition.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Sand Point City Council authorizes the City Administrator to submit a petition to the Alaska Local Boundary Commission using the Legislative Review Method, and that this resolution shall become effective immediately.

OLD BUSINESS

ATV CODE OF ORDINANCES

Alaska

Minimum Age Requirement. Children on certain public lands must be 14 years old to operate an ATV unless they are supervised by an adult.

Safety Education Certification Requirement. Children under 18 operating ATVs on public lands without adult supervision must have a safety certificate.

Washington

Minimum Age Requirement: To cross a highway or to drive an ATV on a highway, operators must be 13 years old. On specified lands, riders that are not at least 13 years old must be supervised by an individual who is at least 18 years old and holds a valid driver's license.

Heimet and/or Eye Protection Requirement: All riders must wear an approved helmet except if the ATV is operated for an exempted activity such as agriculture.

Colorado

Minimum Age Requirement. No person under age ten may operate an ATV on any public street, road, or highway unless under the immediate supervision of an individual who holds a valid driver's license.

Vermont

Minimum Age Requirement: Riders in Vermont must be 12 years old or be supervised to operate ATVs. To cross a highway or to operate an ATV on a highway, riders must be at least 12 years old and, If they are under 16 years old, supervised by an adult. Unless they possess a safety certificate, a rider under 18 years old may operate an ATV only on his or her own property, the property of a parent or guardian, or under the supervision of a certified safety instructor

Safety Education Certification Requirement. Persons under age 18 must have a safety certificate to operate an ATV in Vermont.

Utah

Basic OHV Laws and Rules

- Wear Your Helmet: For riders and passengers under age 18, it's the law, but we advise everyone to wear a helmet. It can save your life. Properly worn, a helmet won't reduce vision or hearing, and helps cut out windblast. Gloves, abrasion resistant clothing, and over the ankle boots are also highly recommended
- Youth, 8-15 years of age, must take the Utah Know Before You Go! certification course before operating an OHV on public land
- Protect Your Privilege Ride only in areas designated as open to OHVs Stay on Trails
- Ride on the right side of the road and in single file
- Be alert to oncoming traffic, especially on blind curves or in dips and crests of hills
- It is illegal to drive an OHV while under the influence of alcohol or drugs
- A red or orange "whip flag" must be attached to OHVs when riding in sand dune areas
- Lights must be used between sunset and sunrise
- Be sure your brakes will control and stop your OHV
- Mufflers with an approved spark arrestor are required on all OHVs (snowmobiles do not require spark arrestors)

The Utah's Off-Highway Vehicle Program brochure outlines the basic responsibilities of Utah's OHV riders. The brochure covers registration, equipment, and operation requirements, safety tips, courtesy and ethics.

Montana

Laws & Regulations

All riders in Montana who are under the age of 16 and over the age of 11 are REQUIRED to complete an approved ATV Safety Course, and carry the Montana ATV Safety Certificate with them while riding on public roads open to full size vehicles.

Note:

In order to operate on designated roads, OHVs must be street legal (licensed). These vehicles must also be equipped with all the required "street-legal" gear, including headlights, brake lights, a working muffler, etc. Please consult state regulations for required equipment.

In order to ride on public lands in Montana, all OHVs must be registered with the state and display a current registration decal.

ATV Safety Gear Requirements

Montana State Parks, a division of Montana Fish, Wildlife and Parks strongly encourages ALL ATV riders to wear a proper helmet, eye protection, gloves and over-the-ankle boots when riding any ATV. A helmet is the single most important piece of safety equipment you can have, and wearing one while riding can save your life! All riders under the age of 18 are required by state law to wear a helmet.


Ride Safe and Legal!

Before heading out on Montana's ATV and OHV trails, please remember the following tips to ensure a safe and enjoyable ride:

- Always wear appropriate safety gear when riding.
- · Ensure your ATV is properly registered in the state.
- · Always stay on designated trails. Stay off paved roads
- · Obtain the landowner's permission before going onto private land.
- Know before you go contact the landowner or land management agency to find out about open ATV trails or routes
- Never, ever ride an ATV while under the influence of drugs or alcohol

Oregon ATV Safety Education Requirements

The state of Oregon is currently phasing in mandatory ATV safety education for all riders by the year 2014. Each year since 2009, a new age group has been required to carry the Oregon ATV Safety Education Card according to the schedule below.



As of January 1, 2012, online training is required for all operators under the age of 50. By January 1, 2014, ALL operators must complete online training to obtain an ATV safety education card.

Additional hands-on training is required for youth 15 and under. For more information on hands-on training, go to www.oregonohv.org/OPRD/ATV/

Age Restrictions in Oregon

There is no minimum age for operating a Class I ATV. Dirt bike operators must be at least seven years old.

Youth 15 years of age and under must be supervised by an adult who can provide immediate assistance and direction. Supervising adults are required to carry an ATV Safety Education Card.

8.13.010 Negligent, reckless or vexatious operation.

- A. No person shall operate an off-highway vehicle upon any street, roadway or alley located within city limits in a:
 - 1. Reckless manner, as provided in AS 28.35.040(a);
 - 2. Negligent manner, as provided in AS $\underline{28}.35$.045(a), so as to endanger the safety of any person or property; or
 - 3. Vexatious manner, as defined in Section 8.13.130 of this chapter so as to disturb the public peace in violation of Section 9.18.010.
- B. Lawfully conducted snowmobile or other off-highway vehicle racing or exhibition events are not subject to the provisions of this section. (Ord. 91-11 §3(part); Ord. 88-12 §3(part))

8.13.020 Operator eligibility.

Individuals may operate an off-highway vehicle upon all streets, and roadways within the city limits without a valid automobile operator's license since the council has designated all streets and roadways as being exempted from the valid automobile operator's license requirement for off-road vehicles. (Ord. 2005-07 §2: Ord. 2000-05 §5: Ord. 95-10 §4(part): Ord. 91-11(A) §3: Ord. 91-11 §3(part): Ord. 89-11 §2(part): Ord. 88-12 §3(part))

8.13.040 Helmets.

No person may:

- A. Operate an off-highway vehicle other than a snowmobile without wearing a helmet which meets the safety standards set by the United States Department of Transportation, if the person is less than eighteen years of age;
- B. Operate an off-highway vehicle other than a snowmobile while transporting a passenger who is less than eighteen years of age and who is not wearing such a helmet;

C. Ride as a passenger on an off-highway vehicle other than a snowmobile without wearing such a helmet, if the person is less than eighteen years of age. (Ord. 89-11 §2(part): Ord. 88-12 §3(part))

8.13.050 Required equipment.

- A. No snowmobile or other off-highway vehicle may be operated upon any street within the city unless it is equipped with:
 - 1. All equipment, in good working order, which is required for such a vehicle by <u>13 AAC 04.400</u> through 04.420 in the weather and light conditions under which the vehicle is operated; and
 - 2. A muffler system, in good working order, which prevents operation of the vehicle from causing a violation of Section <u>9.18.010</u>.
- B. This section does not authorize any person to operate any vehicle which does not comply with any other equipment requirement which is applicable to the vehicle under state or federal statute or regulation. (Ord. 89-11 §2(part): Ord. 88-12 §3(part))

8.13.060 Seating for operators and passengers.

A person operating an off-highway vehicle on any street, roadway or alley within the city limits shall ride only on a permanent seat attached to the vehicle; and shall not carry another person on the vehicle unless it is equipped with seating for each person carried. No more than two people shall ride at a time on an off-highway vehicle, except that this section does not apply to a parent carrying an infant in amaaq. (Ord. 95-10 §4(part): Ord. 91-11 §3(part))

8.13.070 Parental responsibility.

No parent or guardian may authorize or knowingly permit a child under the age of sixteen to violate any provisions of this chapter. (Ord. 95-10 §4(part): Ord. 88-12 §3(part))

8.13.075 Owner's responsibility.

The owner of a snowmobile or other off-highway vehicle may not authorize or knowingly permit another person to operate the vehicle in violation of the provisions of this chapter. (Ord. 95-10 §4(part): Ord. 89-11 §2(part))

8.13.080 Hearing procedures.

Pursuant to AS <u>47.10.010(b)</u>, a minor accused of a violation of this chapter shall be charged, prosecuted, and sentenced in the district court in the same manner as an adult. Subject to the provisions of AS <u>22.15.010</u> through AS <u>22.15.270</u>, a person cited with a violation under this chapter shall answer the charge before the magistrate of the district court. (Ord. 89-11 §2(part): Ord. 88-12 §3(part))

8.13.090 Registration decals.

- A. A person may not operate or park a snowmobile or other off-highway vehicle on any street within the city unless the vehicle has been registered by a person at least eighteen years old with the city. An application for registration shall be filed with the city of Barrow office of the Department of Motor Vehicles upon forms provided by the city and the application shall furnish the following information:
 - 1. The name, address and age of the person registering the vehicle;
 - 2. A description of the vehicle, including the year, make, model and serial number;
 - 3. Proof of ownership; and

- 4. Such other information as the mayor may require.
- B. The registrant shall be provided a registration decal. A person may not operate or park a snowmobile or other off-highway vehicle on any street within the city unless a registration decal is affixed to the rear portion of the vehicle.
- C. A registration decal is valid for as long as the registrant is the owner of the vehicle.
- D. A failure to display the registration decal is a violation of this chapter and punishable pursuant to Section <u>8.13.140</u>. No decal shall be obscure, hidden or damaged.
- E. This section shall not apply to any vehicle at any time during which it:
 - 1. Is validly registered with the state of Alaska pursuant to AS <u>05.30</u> or other applicable state statute or regulation; and
 - 2. Displays numbered registration decals required by AS <u>05.30.040</u>. (Ord. 2008-20 §2; Ord. 89-11 §2(part): Ord. 88-12 §3 (part))

8.13.100 Registration fee.

No registration decal shall be issued until the applicant has paid a fee of five dollars to the city. Upon good showing, the mayor shall waive this fee. (Ord. 88-12 §3(part))

8.13.110 Registration decals not transferable.

Registration decals issued under this chapter are personal to the registrant and may not be sold, loaned, traded, or otherwise transferred by the registrant. (Ord. 88-12 §3(part))

8.13.130 Definitions.

For the purposes of this chapter, the following words and phrases shall have the following meanings:

- A. "Off-highway vehicle" means an off-highway vehicle as defined by 13 AAC 40.010(30).
- B. "Operate" means to have actual control over the operation of a vehicle.
- C. "Operator" means a person who operates or is in actual control of a vehicle.
- D. "Snowmobile" means a snowmobile as defined by $\underline{13}$ AAC $\underline{40.010}$ (49) or a snow vehicle as defined by AS $\underline{05.30}$.120.
- E. "Street," "roadway" and "alley" each mean a street as defined by Section 1.04.010(R), and includes the full width of the street, whether or not developed or actually used for vehicular travel. Every "highway," as defined by AS 28.40.100(a)(6) (including but not limited to the "roadway" portion thereof, as defined by AS 28.40.100(a)(14)), and every "vehicular way or area," as defined by AS 28.40.100(a)(19) is a "street" for purposes of this chapter, if located within the city.
- F. "Vehicle" means a snowmobile or an off-highway vehicle.
- G. "Vexatious" means to operate a vehicle in such a manner as to cause excessive noise in violation of Section 9.18.010. Operation of a vehicle shall be presumed excessively noisy (i.e., "vexatious") in violation of Section 8.13.010, if the sound emitted exceeds 85 dBA (decibels) as measured from fifty or more feet. (Ord. 91-11 §3(part); Ord. 89-11 §2(part): Ord. 88-12 §3 (part))

8.13.140 Penalty.

A violation of any provision of this chapter shall constitute an infraction and shall be punishable by a maximum fine of three hundred dollars, except that no fine in excess of one hundred dollars shall be imposed for any violation of Sections <u>8.13.090</u> or <u>8.13.110</u>. (Ord. 89-11 §2 (part): Ord. 88-12 §3(part))

Dear Fishermen's Finest,

The City of Sand Point requires buyers to pay and sellers to collect a 4% sales tax "on all sales within corporate limits of the city" (SPC 6.10.110(a)). In addition, the city levies a 2% tax on all sales of raw fish delivered directly or indirectly by a seller to a buyer within the City. (SPC 6.10.110(b)). Sales occur within the City "if any significant element of the making or performance of the sale agreement occurs within the City" (SPC 6.10.120). Under Section 6.10.130 of the city code, both the seller and the buyer are legally responsible for paying, collecting, and remitting sales tax on each taxable transaction within Sand Point.

Fishermen's Finest is a seller of raw seafood or processed seafood. Seafood is sold by Fishermen's Finest within city boundaries. Accordingly, Fishermen's Finest is legally responsible for remittance of the applicable sales tax to the City (SPC 6.10.130).

We are enclosing sales tax returns for Fishermen's Fund to complete and file. Please do so by April 14, 2016. Failure to submit a return will result in the city estimating the tax due and making a sales tax assessment as allowed by SPC 6.10.320(h).

These transactions constitute doing business in Sand Point. A city business license is required per SPC 9.10.020. Please complete and return the enclosed business license application by April 14, 2016 for all years in which Fishermen's Finest has sold seafood in Sand Point and for calendar year 2016.

I recently attended the Southwest Alaska Municipal Conference (SWAMC) annual meeting in Anchorage, where Groundfish Forum Executive Director Chris Woodley gave a presentation on the economic impacts of the Amendment 80 Fleet on coastal communities, including Sand Point. One of the benefits he noted was the amount of local taxes the fleet generates for our fish-dependent communities, so I am sure you can agree that our request falls right in line with the message that Mr. Woodley was conveying to the audience.

The Sand Point city code is available online at www.sandpointak.com/code-of-ordinances. There you will find more specific information on city sales tax and business license code. I have enclosed a 2016 business license application and a few blank sales returns. I assume the company's total sales for the previous year were more than \$100,000, so a monthly return is required for all months that business was done in Sand Point. 



On March 14 - 21, I visited Nome, Alaska on my own dime for PTO and a little work.


Highlights:

What is cancer of the colon and rectum?


Cancer is a growth inside your body that should



Most colon cancers start from polyps (see picture inside) in the colon or rectum, shown in blue in the drawing inside. Over time, polyps can turn into cancer.

Is colon cancer common among Alaska Natives?

Yes, colon cancer occurs more often among Alaska Natives than among other racial or ethnic groups. Most of the time, colon cancer is found in people age 50 or older, but people younger than 50 can get it, too.



In the early stages of colon cancer, there are often no symptoms. This means that someone could have colon cancer and not know it. That is why it is important to be tested regularly. Of course, colon cancer can sometimes have symptoms:

- blood in or on the bowel movement
- a change in bowel habits, such as having diarrhea or being constipated
- bowel movements that are thinner than usual
- pain, aches, or cramps in the abdomen that you can't explain
- frequent gas pains
- losing weight for no reason you know of



Many other health problems can cause these symptoms, too. If you have any of these symptoms, see your doctor. Only your doctor can tell you why you're having them.

Who should get a colon cancer screening test?

If you are 50 or older, you should start getting regular tests for colon cancer. There are different kinds of screening tests. Talk with your doctor about which test you should get. Tests can find polyps and can also find colon cancer early. When colon cancer is found early, medical treatment works best and can save your life.

Does someone in your family have colon cancer?

You have a greater chance of developing colon cancer if someone in your family has had colon cancer or polyps. So it is very important to tell this to your doctor. Your doctor may want to test you earlier (before age 50) and more often than other people.

Screening tests for colon cancer

Fecal Occult Blood Test (FOBT)

This test looks for hidden blood in your bowel movement. For three bowel movements in a row, you place a small piece of bowel movement on a card. Then you return the card to the doctor, and the doctor tests to see if there is blood.

Blood in the stool can be a sign of colon cancer, but several other things may cause blood to be in the bowel movement.

Some of these things may be more common to Alaska Natives and include:

- Eating Native and other meats before the test
- Bleeding from the stomach or other places in your body
- A common stomach germ, called H. pylori, that can cause bleeding

For these reasons, this test may not be the first choice for Alaska Natives. Talk to your doctor about having this test.

Sigmoidoscopy

This test looks for polyps in the lower part of the colon. A doctor

puts a short, flexible tube inside the anus and lower part of the colon to allow him or her to see inside. This test should usually be done every five years.

Colonoscopy
This test looks for polyps in the entire colon. A doctor puts a long, flexible tube inside the anus and in the entire colon to allow him or her to see any polyps inside. Most polyps can be removed during the test. This test is usually done every 10 years.

Double Contrast Barium Enema

This test is an x-ray of the colon. You will have an enema with a white liquid called barium. Then the doctor will take an x-ray. The barium makes it easy for the doctor to see the outline of the colon on the x-ray. This test is usually done every 5-10 years.

Terms you may hear your doctor say

Colon

The same thing as the large intestine. It is about six feet long. Food you eat passes through the colon, where it turns into waste matter, or bowel movement.

Rectum

The last eight to ten inches of the large intestine. Bowel movements travel through the rectum and pass out of the body through the anus.

Polyp

A growth inside the colon or rectum that is not normal. [See the picture to the left.] These growths sometimes turn into cancer if they are not removed.

Gastroenterologist

A doctor who is an expert on diseases of the colon, rectum, stomach, and small intestine.
