2. Donation Request: Close-Up

Close-Up Advisor Steven Schwing spoke on behalf of the Close-Up class regarding their donation request to go to Washington D.C and New York in April.

At the pleasure of the council, guests in the audience in town for the Superintendent Search introduced themselves. This included the two candidates, Helen Cheek and Michael Franklin, and Joann Henderson from the Alaska Association of School Boards.

REPORTS:

Finance Officer - Kurtis Gundersen

Finance Officer Kurtis Gundersen's report was included in the packet. He reported that \$2,762.41 was received in December for Raw Fish Tax, and \$79,385.83 was received in Sales Tax.

Council Member Arlene Gundersen asked for a clarification of the amount of Raw Fish Tax reported because it did not match the Revenue report. The Raw Fish Tax totaled \$177,568.80 and the Revenue Guideline showed \$247,585.19. Finance Officer Kurtis Gundersen stated that he believed that the Revenue Guideline included January's amount, which isn't included on the Raw Fish Tax report.

Administrator – Jordan Keeler

Administrator Jordan Keeler's read his report included in the packet. He added that he finished the preliminary draft for the harbor bridge grant application and foot bridge and have sent them off to the AML grant writers and submitted written testimony on behalf of the City of Sand Point to the Board of Fish for the upcoming meeting that he will be attending. He has been in contact with the lobbyist in Juneau to see if there are any updates that may have an impact on the City, send him the CAPSIS application for the incinerator and the CTP and STP grant applications. Senator Murkowski's office is now accepting earmark applications, due March 10, and he will check on the requirements and apply for a grader and a rear-loading trash truck. He worked with department heads to identify phone lines that are no longer needed.

Police Chief – David Anderson

Police Chief David Anderson's read his and Officer Lowery's reports included in the packet. He added that they have been working with the Dewberry Company's Geospatial, Mapping, and Surveying Services out of Anchorage on the 911 Addressing System and it is coming along.

3. Harbor Electricity Plus PCE

Administrator Jordan Keeler explained the changes in PCE from TDX due to the most recent reduction in the City of Sand Point's census population estimate change and that the City has had to back bill to the harbor users because TDX made corrections to their bills months later. To get the population estimate amended, it would require a door-to-door census and a passed resolution contesting the count. He also recommends reviewing the harbor billing methods.

4. FY24 Aleutians East Borough Community Budget Request

The council gave direction to Administration to submit a budget request from the City of Sand Point for \$100,000 to use as a match for a new incinerator, and if other funding is received for that, to use as matching funds for the CTP and STP grants.

5. GCI Building Permit Application

This item was tabled until the next meeting for Administration to get more information on GCI's clean up plans and make sure there is a clear understanding of both the City and GCI's roles and responsibilities of the project.

Here is a summary of items since our last meeting:

- Attended several days of the Board of Fish meetings. I gave oral testimony on behalf of the City and the impact on municipal finances and obligations that would be hard to meet if Proposal 140 was passed.
- Received the AML contracted grant writer's feedback on the CTP/TAP and made the changes they suggested. I then sent to our regional DOT+PF planner for her feedback, which was rather positive and added a few items at her suggestion. Both applications were submitted a few days before the deadline of February 28.
- Submitted the CAPSIS application to the State for funding for a new incinerator. There hasn't been much movement on a capital budget as of yet and we won't know until the State's budget is passed before July 1.
- Spoke with a grant representative at the Denali Commission about their funding notice for projects. I then began work on the DC grant, much of which I was able to crib from the CDBG application as the criteria and information requests are fairly similar. I will have this over to the AML grant review team for their review and then submit by April 14 deadline.
- Attended SWAMC and acted as Sand Point's representative for the business meeting. I did see Brian Whilden and he mentioned that they were very close to Aleutian Airways starting service. The announcement was made this week that they would start service May 1 to Sand Point on the ANC-SDP-CDB-ANC triangle route.
- Spoke with public works in Unalaska on their experience with the AU Fiber Project and then followed up further with GCI to get more detail. The results of the conversations are summed up in the memo on their development permit.
- Filled out the general liability forms for the City for FY 24. Previous emails from AML/JIA indicate that our premiums will go up to 15-20%, but we won't have the quote until sometime in May. It may be worth exploring allocating insurance costs across each department so that the general fund isn't eating the costs incurred by non-GF activities like the harbor.

Resolution 23-06 for your consideration revises the Capital Improvement Project (CIP) list for the City of Sand Point. Having a CIP is important when applying to funding sources to demonstrate the projects on the list have gone through a public review, is relatively up-to-date, and shows that the City has considered its capital needs and ranked them accordingly. Having a CIP is not a guarantee of funding, but most agencies will take into account whether or not a project is on the CIP, and where it ranks on the CIP relative to similar, if any, projects.

The CIP is not a one-time list of needs but can be changed and updated at any time to reflect the current situation in the community as projects are either completed or re-prioritized. The list can also be revised to be tailored to a certain funding agency by listing a specifically targeted project above one that may have a greater overall need and then switched back at as needed.

For this revised version of the City's CIP, I have the damn/culvert repair as the top priority followed by a new incinerator, then the two projects that I submitted funding requests for, which would be the harbor road bridge rehab and harbor foot bridge rehab, followed by new equipment for public works. AML will be applying for funding for the new heavy equipment for public works as part of a larger equipment request on behalf of several smaller communities in the state. Removed from the list is the City Hall repair and paving of all roads in the community.

GCI has applied for a development permit to install fiber optic lines on a door-to-door basis in Sand Point. This came up at the last meeting but was tabled due to lack of clarity on their plans. After follow up conversation, they clarified that no cuts will be made to pavement and any road crossings where there is pavement will be made with a special machine made to bore under the road. They have also proposed weekly or daily meetings if needed to coordinate the upcoming digs and ask for any locates that will be needed. On that note, I did pass along the name of Dennis McGlashan as somebody they could hire locally who has in-depth knowledge of the locations of the water and sewer lines. GCI also committed to raking and reseeding disturbed ground where possible. Of note, they did get a \$250k performance bond for their work in Unalaska and they indicated they are willing to do the same in Sand Point.

Dear Mr. Keeler:

Unicom, Inc. (Unicom), a subsidiary of GCI Communications Corp. (GCI) is seeking a development permit and approvals from the City of Sand Point to install fiber optic cable to bring broadband access to the residents of Sand Point.

Project Description

This effort is part of the AU Aleutian Project, which will deliver fast, reliable broadband service to six rural Alaska Native Aleut villages for the first time, including Sand Point. This project will support economic development and social services. The lack of broadband access limits economic development and efficiency of services delivered by health care providers, schools, and tribal entities. The subsea cable has been installed, with community-specific installation occurring in the next year.

Unicom has received full funding for this project from the U.S. Department of Agriculture, Rural Utilities Service (RUS) and has been installed in Unalaska, with installation in King Cove and Sand Point scheduled for completion this year.

All federal approvals and consultations related to cultural resources, historic properties, endangered species and wetlands are completed. A full environmental assessment that describes the project in detail, discloses potential impacts, and documents agency concurrence is available here: https://www.rd.usda.gov/sites/default/files/au aleutian ea final.pdf

The project in Sand Lake includes the following:

- Buried broadband fiber cable through trenching no deeper than 3 feet in depth and 3 feet wide. Trenching will occur within existing road rights-of-way (ROW) and within existing disturbance when feasible (as shown in green)
- Fiber cable installed along existing utility poles (as shown in red)

AMHS 2023 Summer Schedule Now Available for Booking

(**JUNEAU, Alaska**)—The Alaska Marine Highway System (AMHS) has released its Summer 2023 schedule, allowing bookings for travel this summer. This schedule is different from the Summer of 2022, as challenges with hiring skilled crew prevent AMHS from running both the Kennecott and the Columbia at the same time. The May 1 through Sept. 30 schedule represents a baseline service that will be increased as AMHS crewing improves.

To provide the most reliable service to Alaskans, the 2023 summer schedule will include the M/V Columbia, the M/V LeConte, and the M/V Hubbard as the primary vessels servicing Southeast Alaska. The M/V Tustumena will continue to serve Southwest Alaska, the M/V Aurora will continue to serve Prince William Sound, and the M/V Lituya will continue to serve the Ketchikan area. The M/V Kennicott and M/V Tazlina will be off-line for the time being due to skilled crew shortages, but will be brought back on-line once hiring increases. The M/V Matanuska remains in layup due to needed repairs.

Hiring new and experienced crew is the most significant challenge in moving beyond a baseline ferry schedule. Since January, AMHS has taken additional steps to hire and recruit skilled workers. Those changes have included extending the signing bonus for IBU members,

increased advertising throughout Alaska and the Lower-48, outreach to all Alaska High Schools, and reestablishing an AMHS job fair presence throughout the state and Lower-48. The department is also considering establishing a conditional hire program for qualified candidates awaiting credentialing paperwork, a shipboard internship program, and a Ketchikan-based training program.

The baseline schedule focuses on service to Alaskans in the three coastal regions that AMHS serves—Southeast, Southwest, and Prince William Sound. Running the M/V Columbia strengthens the overall reliability of the system this summer, as the crewing requirements are less stringent for inside waters. Until AMHS hires additional crew to sail the M/V Kennicott, Prince Rupert, Yakutat, and cross-gulf sailings to Whittier will not be included on the baseline schedule.

"DOT&PF and AMHS will be seeking alternative travel arrangements for Cross Gulf, Prince Rupert and Yakutat travel," said DOT&PF Commissioner Ryan Anderson. "While we are hopeful we can get the Kennicott crewed over the next months, we will also be evaluating possibilities to continue Prince Rupert service through alternative means and provide supplemental service for Yakutat and cross Gulf of Alaska connections."

Governor's Amended FY 2024 Budget

- Governor Dunleavy recently unveiled <u>a package of amendments to his FY 2024 budget</u> <u>proposals</u>, increasing the expected deficit to about \$400 million for the upcoming fiscal year. His proposals increase funding for the Office of Public Advocacy, the Public Defender Agency, and the Division of Public Assistance, \$24 million to offset an expected shortfall in Medicaid support for extra pandemic-era contributions to the health care, and over \$500 million in capital spending (most of which is with federal funds). More details about his proposals can be found <u>here</u> and <u>here</u>.
- A critical part of this package involves funding the match needed for <u>the \$285 million in federal funds</u> provided to the Alaska Marine Highway System (AMHS) back in January. Under the governor's plan, these funds will come from a combination of existing funds in the operating budget and the vessel replacement fund, plus use of other federal funds based on existing state expenditures for vessel overhaul work and vessel operations using a federal toll credit system. The awarded grants includes \$44 million in federal money to fund Calendar Year 2023 vessel operations. **The current operating budget anticipated around \$83 million in federal infrastructure funds, leaving a shortfall of \$39 million for the legislature to address unless more federal funds are obtained.**

Senator Lisa Murkowski's Annual Address

- U.S. Senator Lisa Murkowski (*R-Alaska*) delivered her annual address to a joint session of the Alaska Legislature on February 22nd. A copy of her speech can be found <u>here</u> and a recorded video can be found <u>here</u>. Sen. Murkowski reflected on prior-year accomplishments and detailed future challenges and goals, as outlined below:
 - <u>State Infrastructure Projects</u>: Sen. Murkowski celebrated the nearly \$3.2 billion in funding from the bipartisan infrastructure bill allocated for the construction and modernization of "core infrastructure" in Alaska. She highlighted \$285 million for the Alaska Marine Highway, \$250 million for Nome's Arctic Deep Draft Port, and \$210 million for Coast Guard projects in Kodiak to support Offshore Patrol Cutters. Murkowski also said that the Department of Energy is "standing up the \$1 billion program created for energy improvement in rural and remote areas."
 - Policy Wins: Sen. Murkowski summarized several policy achievements, including the passage of the University of Alaska Fiscal Foundation Act, which, through a 360,000-acre land grant, will provide additional revenue to "support its students, faculty, and campus infrastructure"; the reauthorization of the Violence Against Women Act; and funds for subsistence harvesters "affected by fisheries disasters" and expedited aid for communities impacted by Typhoon Merbok. Lastly, she included details regarding investments in our military, including \$335 million for military construction and increases in pay and benefits for military service members.
 - <u>Economic Concerns</u>: Citing "ten straight years of net outmigration," declining GDP, and disproportionately low employment growth, Sen. Murkowski stressed the importance of continued resource development and making Alaska a place where "people want to move and stay." She applauded legislators for their recent passage of a resolution supporting the Willow project. However, Murkowski urged legislators to also focus on solving gaps in the availability of workforce development, childcare, transportation, and housing to keep Alaskans here and attract newcomers. A summary of Alaska's population decline can be found <u>here</u>.
 - <u>Transportation</u>: Stating that she "almost never calls on the legislature to do anything specific," **Murkowski asked for support in approving matching funds for the Alaska Marine Highway.** "We have an unprecedented opportunity to refloat our struggling ferry system. This is our shot. This is a lifeline. Grab it." She also suggested continued conversation on the development of the northern rail extension and Mat-Su rail connection and the modernization of the Port of Alaska.

Congresswoman Mary Peltola Addresses Legislature

- On February 17th, U.S. Representative Mary Peltola (*D-Alaska*) briefly addressed a joint session of the Alaska Legislature for the first time in her congressional role. Rep. Peltola, a moderate Democrat from Bethel who served in the Alaska State Legislature from 1999 to 2009, explained that she continues to employ the "Alaska Model" in D.C., a bipartisan or multipartisan effort to work with all lawmakers, regardless of party identity, to "tackle" challenging policy issues.
- Some of the issues she presented included a summary of the federal infrastructure funding for a variety of Alaska projects; a call to action to invest in future generations of Alaskans; and clear support, from all members of the Alaska delegation, of the Willow project. Lastly, Peltola provided background on her "pro-fish" campaign and why it's critical to fight for fish. "Climate change, bycatch, inadequate research funding, and an antiquated management system have left us with ecosystems on the brink of collapse. Our economy depends on fish. Our cultures depend on fish. All Alaskans depend on fish." A copy of her speech can be found here and a recorded video can be found here.

Other Capitol News

- <u>New Division of Elections Director</u>: Lt. Governor Nancy Dahlstrom appointed Carol Beecher to lead the Alaska Division of Elections following the retirement of Gail Fenumiai. Beecher has worked for the state since 2005 in a variety of capacities including head of the child support division. She has long supported the Republican party and has a history making campaign contributions to Republican candidates. Lt. Gov. Dahlstrom said in a statement that Beecher's "professionalism and extensive experience will ensure that Alaska is ready for the 2024 election cycle and beyond." - Degree Requirement Removed for State Jobs: In an effort to address "an unprecedented workforce shortage," Governor Dunleavy issued an order that removes the requirement of a four-year college degree for most state jobs. "The State of Alaska is committed to increasing economic opportunities for the people of Alaska by expanding the path to public employment. Many jobs can be filled by Alaskans who have relevant work experience, skills, or competency-based training." The order takes effect immediately.
- Senate Begins Analysis of State Retirement Systems: Providing public employees a new retirement option including a pension is one of the Senate Majority's top priorities. Several bills are under consideration, with a new one expected shortly. Most are structured to give employees in the Public Employees' Retirement System (PERS) or the Teachers' Retirement System (TRS) a choice between the present defined contribution (DC) system, or to join a new defined benefit (DB) pension tier. Senate Finance received a presentation this week from the Division of Retirement & Benefits showing there is a "benefits gap" compared to the old pension plan.
- <u>Representative David Eastman Censured, Again</u>: Following a series of controversial comments in a <u>House Judiciary Committee hearing</u>, Rep. Eastman (*R-Wasilla*) was censured by the House of Representatives with a vote of 35-1 (Eastman was the "no" vote). In committee, during a presentation by the Alaska Children's Trust, Eastman asked if an abused child were to die, would the state benefit economically. He later claimed he was making a point about economic arguments for abortion. Fellow Judiciary Committee member Representative Andrew Gray (*D-Anchorage*) made the censure motion on the floor for "offensive, insulting and unsubstantiated claims that undermine the dignity of the House." Eastman was censured in 2017 for offensive comments.
