Finance Officer Kurtis Gundersen reported that for the month of January the City received \$28,856.65 in Raw Fish Tax and \$50,610.18 in Sales Tax.

Administrator – Debi Schmit

Administrator Debi Schmit read her report included in the packet. She added that they can use ANTHC's plans for the Johnson Avenue Sewer upgrade if other funding can be received. Also, that the grant for the harbor bridge was not funded and she is planning to use the grant application to apply for other funding with possible help from a tribe. In addition, they are working with the Denali Commission on gear replacement for the Peter Pan fishermen who lost their gear in the fire, with the help of Ernie Weiss from Aleutians East Borough and Liza Mack at the Denali Commission. Alaska Municipal League asked the City to submit a list of all the equipment we need at the City because there \$4 million available for 8 communities across Southwest Alaska to help fund equipment, specifically for the dump.

Here is a summary of items since our last meeting:

- I was out of the office to attend Aleut Corporation planning sessions the week of March 17th.
- A request to the state for two pieces of equipment for the landfill and a grader was submitted. I finalized the request for emergency money for Johnson's Avenue in CAPSIS with Representative Edgmon's office. We received a grant for \$30,000 from DEC to hire a consultant for the lead pipe inspection this summer.
- I met with ICE on March 26th to finalize the equipment needed to complete our internet connection to GCI. This significant step forward will greatly enhance our communication and data management capabilities, ensuring a more efficient and secure city operation. The cybersecurity assessment, another important aspect of our city's safety, will also be conducted soon. I plan to include the server and all other equipment in the next grant.
- Since the last meeting, I have dedicated time to planning the city's strategic planning session details. I am eagerly looking forward to this session, as it will be a valuable opportunity for us to collectively shape our city's future.
- We need to perform a required inspection on the bridge at the harbor. I will determine the details and set up the work.
- I attended the City's Finance Committee's first meeting. I look forward to upcoming meetings and their input on budget and finance topics. With that said, I will begin working on the FY25 Budget right after this meeting.

SUBJECT: FY24 Mid-year Budget Amendment 2nd Reading

SUMMARY: Ordinance 24-01 is for a mid-year FY24 budget amendment.

PREVIOUS COUNCIL ACTION: This amends the FY24 operating budget, or Ordinance 23-01.

DISCUSSION: The mid-year amendment reflects fisheries after the FY24 budget is passed, usually in June before the salmon season. The mid-year assessment allows you to amend the revenue and expenditures in the general fund as appropriate. Like recent years, expenses continue to outpace revenue due to less fishing and other issues with the fishing industry.

ALTERNATIVES: We can keep using reserves or cut the operating budget in FY25. I can work with the Finance Committee to get their recommendations on areas to cut.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS: The council should continue to monitor the budget closely and act accordingly. There are so many unknowns in our fishing industry that we need to monitor revenues closely and look for opportunities to diversify our revenue stream. Now that I have this year's experience, I am much more confident.

LEGAL: No legal review is required.

CITY ADMINISTRATOR RECOMMENDATION: Staff recommends a motion to put Ordinance 2024-01: FY 24 Budget Amendment on the floor for the second reading.

PROPOSED MOTION: I move to put Ordinance 2024-01: FY 24 Budget Amendment on the floor for a second reading.

ORDINANCE 2024-02

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF SAND POINT AMENDING CHAPTER 4: FIRE DEPARTMENT OF THE SAND POINT MUNICIPAL CODE.

WHEREAS, the City of Sand Point recognizes the need for complete and clear language in our municipal code;

WHEREAS, the certain language currently in city code is out of date;

WHEREAS, Chapter 4 requires updating;

NOW BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF SAND POINT, ALASKA:

Section 1: This is a code ordinance.

Section 2: Effective Date. This ordinance shall be effective immediately.

Section 3: Content. Chapter 4 of the Sand Point Municipal Code is hereby amended to read as follows [new language is underlined, old language is struck through].

§ 3.40.010. FIRE DEPARTMENT ESTABLISHED

There shall be a Fire Department in and for the City of Sand Point to be known as "Sand Point Volunteer Fire Department." It shall consist of the Fire Chief and Assistant Fire Chief (or Chiefs) and as many other officers and fire fighters as may be deemed necessary for the effective operation of the department.

§ 3.40.020. -Volunteer Fire Department.

- (a) *Organization*. Members of the Volunteer Fire Department may organize into a voluntary association with the election of their own officers and by-laws.
- **(b)** *Limitation on power of volunteer department.* The function and duties of the offices of the volunteer department shall not interfere with those of regular department

- officers who are charged with the responsibility for all fire services activities of the department. The voluntary association shall in no way limit the power of the Fire Chief. All property used by the Fire Department shall be paid by check upon proper voucher by the regular city authorities.
- (c) **Funding by city.** From time to time in such amounts as the Council deems advisable, payments may be made to the volunteer department for the purpose of giving the association funds with which to reimburse members for clothing damaged while attending fires and for such other purposes in keeping with its functions.

§ 3.40.030.-Fire Chief/EMS Coordinator.

(a) Appointment. The Fire Chief/EMS Coordinator shall be appointed by the Mayor subject to confirmation by the Council, and shall be responsible to the Mayor. His/her appointment shall be for an indefinite period of time, depending upon his/her good conduct and efficiency. He/she shall be technically qualified through training and experience and shall have the ability to command volunteers. The chief shall be removed only for just cause.

(b) Powers and duties.

Fire Chief — It shall be the duty of the Fire Chief to assume full charge of all members, apparatus, and equipment, while on parade, at drills, at conventions, and at fires or other emergencies requiring the services of the department. He/she shall have the right to call out any and all members and apparatus for any purpose incidental to this office. He/she shall assume full responsibility for all fire equipment and see to its proper care and maintenance. It shall be his/her responsibility to recommend the purchase of new equipment. He/she shall see that adequate training programs are conducted in the department and shall acquaint himself/herself with all new firefighting methods by attending fire schools, drills and conferences. He/she shall see that proper discipline is maintained in the department.

- (1) The Fire Chief shall determine the number and kind of companies of which the department is to be composed and shall determine the response of such companies to alarms
- (2) HeThe Fire Chief shall appoint all other officers and fire fighters. Such appointments shall be insofar as possible following fair and impartial competitive examination. All officers shall be accountable to the Fire Chief of representative.
- (3) HeThe Fire Chief shall annually submit a tentative budget for his/her department, upon request of the Council.
- (4) <u>HeThe Fire Chief</u> shall assist the proper authorities in suppressing the crime of arson by investigating or causing to be investigated the cause, origin and circumstances of all fires.

<u>EMS Coordinator</u> – It shall be the duty of the EMS Coordinator to evaluate and sign the <u>Sand point Volunteer Fire Department first responder protocols and keep the department</u>

registered and in good standing with the State medical director. He/she shall also work with the EMS service provider as well on any medical procedures they may need.

<u>Assistant Fire Chiefs</u> - The Assistant Fire Chiefs shall be under the orders of the Fire Chief, and in his/her absence shall succeed to his duties and authority in the order of their respective rank.

§ 3.40.040. – Rules and Regulations

The Fire Chief shall maintain and enforce an up-to-date comprehensive set of rules and regulations governing the discipline, training and operation of the Fire Department. Such rules, regulations and any deletions, changes or additions shall be effective when approved and filled with the Council. The Fire Chief shall carry out the enforcement of these rules and regulations and is authorized to suspend or remove from service any officer of fire fighter as provided in the rules and regulations.

<u>Firefighting activities will strictly be limited to exterior firefighting and containment ONLY with NO interior fire attack.</u>

§ 3.40.050. Training and Records

- (a) The Fire Chief or representative shall, provide at least once a month, provide for suitable drills covering the operation and handling of all equipment essential for efficient department operation. In addition, at least four times per year, <u>quarterly sessions of instruction to include such subjects as first aid, water supply, ad other subjects related to fire suppression shall be provided.</u>
- **(b)** The Fire Chief is <u>responsible for ensuring</u> complete records are kept of all apparatus, equipment, personnel, training, inspections, fires, and other department activities.

§ 3.40.060. Equipment; City Owned.

- (a) The Fire chief shall be responsible to the Mayor for recommending such apparatus of other firefighting equipment as may be required to maintain fire department efficiency, and for providing suitable arrangements and equipment for reporting fires or emergencies, and for notifying all members of the department to assure prompt response to such incidents.
- **(b)** The Fire Chief or representative shall have power to assign equipment for response to calls for outside aid where agreements are in force and in other cases only when the absence of such equipment will not jeopardize protection of the city.
- (c) No person shall use any fire apparatus or equipment for any private purpose, nor shall any person willfully and without proper authority take away or conceal any article used in any way by the department.

Introduction and 1st Reading: March 12, 2024

(d) No person shall enter any place where fire apparatus is housed or handle apparatus or equipment belonging to the department unless accompanied by, or having the special permission of an officer or authorized member of the department.

LEGISLATIVE REPORT #24-05

Omnibus Education Bill Veto Sustained, New Efforts Underway

- Governor Dunleavy <u>vetoed the bipartisan education funding bill</u> on March 14, setting up an immediate joint session by the legislature to consider whether to override or sustain his action. According to the governor, he vetoed *Senate Bill No. 140* because it failed to address his priorities to allow the state to establish charter schools and to establish a pilot three-year teacher retention incentive bonus program.
- The legislature met in joint session on March 18 to consider the governor's veto. After nearly three hours of floor debate, they failed to override the veto by a single vote. The vote was 39 in favor of overriding versus 20 votes to sustain the veto. 40 votes are needed under the Alaska Constitution to override a veto of a non-appropriation bill. 16 members of the Senate and 23 members from the House voted to override. The House vote included 7 House majority members.
- Whether the legislature will support passage of another omnibus education funding package is unclear. The alternative will be one-time money added to the state operating budget. Two new bills have been introduced in the House in response to what happened. <u>House Bill No. 391</u> by the House Education Committee permits the state Board of Education & Early Development to authorize charter schools under contract with a local school district. <u>House Bill No. 392</u> by the House Resources Committee reintroduces most of the funding bill like SB 140, plus the governor's bonuses proposal and more money for correspondence study.

Spring Revenue Forecast Projects Increase to State Treasury

- The Department of Revenue released the <u>Spring 2024 Revenue Forecast</u> on March 13. The forecast predicts increased revenue over the next two fiscal years, primarily due to higher oil prices, providing some relief for the legislature as they craft the FY 2025 budgets. While the annual transfer from the Alaska Permanent Fund to the state treasury remains the largest source of state revenue, fluctuations in oil markets impact the overall forecast. Key highlights of the forecast include:
 - Increased Revenue: Compared to the fall 2023 forecast, the state is projected to collect an additional \$58 million in revenue for the current fiscal year ending on June 30, and \$140 million more in revenue during FY 2025. The Alaska North Slope (ANS) oil price forecast increased by \$1.69 per barrel for FY 2024 and \$2.00 per barrel for FY 2025. The oil production forecast has been decreased by 2,800 barrels per day for FY 2024 but increased by 13,100 barrels per day for FY 2025.
 - <u>Impact on the Permanent Fund Dividend</u>: The higher revenue forecast suggests that Alaskans may receive a slightly larger Permanent Fund dividend, with a bonus payment, paid in addition to the amount set by legislators for this year's dividend, due to a provision in last year's budget. The Permanent fund is set to transfer \$3.5 billion to the General Fund for FY 2024 and \$3.7 billion for FY 2025.
 - <u>Budget Considerations</u>: In a presentation to the House Finance Committee, the Legislative Finance
 Division's fiscal analyst, Alexi Painter, reminded lawmakers of major outstanding items that are not
 yet reflected in the operating budget. This includes additional K-12 funding from a new education
 funding package if one occurs, a \$40 million supplemental increase for the Department of Corrections and
 a potential shortfall in the Alaska Marine Highway System's operating budget in calendar year 2025.
 - House Draft Operating Budget Unveiled: On March 22 a revised draft FY 2025 operating budget proposal was presented by the House Finance Committee. It includes \$175 million in one-time K-12 school funding (which is equivalent to a BSA increase of \$680), and a 2024 Permanent Fund dividend of \$2,722 per Alaskan.

Lawmakers Reject 8 of Governor Dunleavy's Executive Orders

- In an unprecedented joint session, the Alaska Legislature rejected eight executive orders (EO) proposed by Governor Dunleavy, while sustaining four others. Those rejected included EO 128 splitting the Alaska Energy Authority board from the Alaska Industrial Development and Export Authority board, and EO 131 removing the legislature's authority to appoint four members of the Alaska Marine Highway Operations Board. Additional detail, including a summary of all 12 executive orders and their respective vote counts, can be found here.
- The rejected proposals included measures affecting state boards regulating professions such as midwifery, barbering, and massage therapy, as well as wildlife management responsibilities. Consequently, these boards will continue their operations. This marked the first time in Alaska's history that the Legislature simultaneously considered 12 executive orders, establishing a significant precedent according to Senate President Gary Stevens (R-Kodiak). "This is an unusual meeting. We have never done this in the history of the state of Alaska."
- Lawmakers allowed the governor to proceed with eliminating four state boards and transferring their functions to state agencies. Those boards include the Alaska Council on Emergency Medical Services, the Criminal Justice Information Advisory Board, the Recreation Rivers Advisory Board, and the Alaska Safety Advisory Council.

Other Capitol News

- Broadband Access Grants (BAG) Legislation Moving: Following the failure to override SB 140 which included the proposal to increase broadband access funding for rural schools, the House passed its version of the bill. House Bill No. 293 by Rep. Edgmon (I-Dillingham) is expected to pass the Senate this week and then head to the governor for signature. If enacted, another \$40 million will be spent annually to increase internet speeds at eligible schools.
- <u>Joint Seafood Industry Task Force Proposal</u>: A <u>new version</u> was presented to the Senate Finance Committee this week. Under this proposal membership is expanded from 7 members to 13 voting members and 3 ex officio members. Three of the voting slots are for "representatives of fishing-dependent coastal communities" with one individual each from rural Western Alaska, the Gulf of Alaska, and Southeast Alaska.
- Congress Passes Native American Housing Appropriation: More than \$1 billion has been approved by Congress (and signed by President Biden) for Native American housing programs, as part of a larger fiscal package for 2024. Funds will be distributed to tribes as block grants, empowering stakeholders to decide how to allocate funds based on their unique housing needs. In 2023, Thomas Lozano, Chairman of the Board for the National American Indian Housing Council, cited Census Bureau data that shows "American Indians and Alaska Natives were almost twice as likely to live in poverty as the rest of the population," he said. Additional information can be found here.
- Tribal Jurisdiction Expanded Under Department of the Interior (DOI) Opinion: A new legal opinion by the DOI Solicitor says tribal jurisdiction applies to individual Alaska Native allotments, unless those lands are owned by a nontribal member or geographically distance from the tribal community. This action is viewed as a significant change reversing a 31-year-old opinion stating Alaska tribes do not have territorial jurisdiction over Alaska Native allotments. It has led to a new court filing by the state of Alaska expressing alarm, calling the opinion a "sea change".
